

DARRICK WOOD SCHOOL
ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2019-2020

The Governing Body of Darrick Wood School has determined the admissions criteria and arrangements for 2019-2020 as follows:

1. Admission to Year 7

1.1 In September 2019, Darrick Wood School will admit 260 pupils into Year 7.

The published admission number is inclusive of students with a statement of special educational needs that are admitted to the school pursuant to the school being named in Section I of their Education, Health and Care Plan.

1.2 In the event of over-subscription, the following criteria will apply in priority order:

(i) Children Looked After (Children in Public Care)

a) A child looked after is a child who is in the care of a local authority or being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions. These children must still be “looked after” when the child starts school unless (b) applies

b) Or a child who was previously looked after and immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence or special guardianship order

(ii) Siblings of pupils in school at the time of proposed entry.

Sibling - in this context, is defined as a full brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent/carer’s partner, and in every case the child should be living in the same family unit at the same address. Sibling applications will only be accepted for siblings of pupils in Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12; siblings of pupils in Year 11 whose parents have confirmed their commitment to the pupil continuing into Year 12 (written confirmation will be required). However, siblings of Year 13 students will not be accepted. A “Parent” is any person who has parental responsibility or care of the child and documentary evidence of residence of the sibling will be required. However, this sibling rule does not apply to siblings of pupils in the Deaf Centre.

(iii) Children of Staff at the School

Darrick Wood may give priority in the oversubscription criteria to children of staff directly employed by the School in either or both of the following circumstances:

a) Where the member of staff has been employed at the School for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the School is made, and/or

b) The member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.

(iv) Proximity

Distance will be measured in a straight line from the front door of the child's home address (including flats) to the main entrance of the School, using the Local Authority's computerized measuring system. This identifies the unique national grid reference (Easting and Northing) for the property. Those living closer to the School receive the higher priority. Where applicants measure the same, the system will go to further decimal places to determine who is nearer. Where applications are received from flats that have the same "Easting and Northing", places will be allocated by door number; the lower the number the higher the priority. 'Home' is where the child normally resides as their only or principal residence. Addresses involved in child minding (professional or relatives) are not considered. Parents will be asked to provide documentary evidence to confirm an address and parental responsibility. Change of parental responsibility, unless exceptional circumstances exist through a court order, will not be accepted during the coordinated admission process. It is expected that the applicant and pupil will still be resident at the same address when the child starts school unless exceptional circumstances apply.

1.3 The School will comply with locally agreed application procedures and timetables. Applications should be made using the Common Application Form.

1.4 Any child not offered a place will be placed on the waiting list and will have the statutory right of appeal. Waiting lists for Year 7 will be maintained in the order of the published admissions criteria until 31st December 2019. Those wishing to appeal should register their intention to do so by sending a letter, addressed to the Chairman of Governors within 14 days of being informed that their child has not been allocated a place.

2. Admission to Year 12

The School will make available sufficient places in Year 12 to allow the transfer of all Year 11 students who meet the published entry criteria for the courses they wish to study. The School will in addition offer a minimum of ten places to external applicants who must meet the same published entry criteria for the courses they wish to study. Students not offered a place will have the statutory right of appeal. Places will be allocated in the following priority order:

- (i) Children Looked after and former looked after young people who meet the published criteria (see definitions in admission criteria for Year 7).
- (ii) Students transferring from Year 11 at Year 2019 who meet the published entry criteria for the courses they wish to study.
- (iii) External applicants who meet the published entry criteria for the courses they wish to study.

3. In-year Year 8-11 Admissions

Whenever an application is received for a student to join a year group at a time other than when joining Year 7, and for Year 7 after 1st January 2020, the School will, in the event of over subscription place the student on the waiting list that will be closed in July 2020. Parents have a statutory right of appeal.

Children directed via Fair Access Protocol will take precedence over any child already on the School waiting list and this includes admitting children over the published admissions number.

4. Admission of children outside their normal age group

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child has experienced problems such as ill health. The School will consider applications outside of the child's normal age group on an individual basis taking into account any information about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional; whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group; and whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely. Parents wishing to apply for a place outside of the normal age group should contact the Head Teacher in writing in the first instance.

5. Falsifying information

Falsifying information to gain advantage in obtaining a school place will lead to the withdrawal of the offer of a place. If it is found that a place has been achieved by falsifying information, any further siblings will not be considered.
